# Growing Up with Nervios

Growing up with “depression” was a taboo subject. If I mentioned the word, my grandmother or mother would immediately tell me I needed Jesus, laid hands on me, prayed and then sent me to church. Other common Hispanic rituals of alleviating depression, anxiety or “nervios” (“nerve problems”) are to go to a curandero, light candles or roll eggs on our bodies then place the egg in a bowl under our bed while you slept to rid of the negative energy. Often in the Hispanic culture if we exhibit any depressive symptoms or “nerve problems” we were just told to “get over it...you will be

okay.” Not knowing that there is a clinical diagnosis for this and having thoughts of being different has often led to treating these feelings with alcohol and drugs causing the depression and anxiety to worsen. If anyone did at-

tempt to get help, “that is the gringo way.” (Whites are 60% more likely to receive mental health treatment than the Hispanic culture). Then, there is the label or the stigma of getting involved in treatment and being stereotyped. “Ella esta loca.” This Stigma often delays or causes minorities to avoid seeking professional help for any mental health symptoms. Other reasons for avoiding treatment are because Hispanics feel they have to resolve their issues on their own or do not want to be a burden.

After I graduated in 1991 with my Bachelors in Social Work I got my first professional position at the local mental health authority clinic.

This is when I fell in love with the mental health field. My knowledge and education has grown since working with this population for over 27 years. Since then I have referred many of my family members. They have finally got the treatment that they should have received many years ago. My only regret is that I did not learn about it earlier so that I could get the help for my Grandmother that has passed on since then.

Don't wait. There is treatment and relief for your extreme feelings of sadness and “ansios”.

# A Call For Immigration Reform

For my entire life I have always heard that children are precious and should be protected by adults. This assumption was reinforced recently in the worldwide response to news that twelve young Thai boys were trapped in a dark and treacherous cave as a result of rapidly rising flood water. It took two weeks, lots of luck and resources, as well as a large team of international divers to rescue the boys.

Their rescue, followed by millions across the globe, brought joy and relief. At about the same time, a Federal Judge in San Diego was issuing an order for Homeland Security (ICE) to end the separation of families who

had crossed into the United States along the U.S.-Mexico border. Moreover, the judge insisted that our federal government reunite those already separated.

By the time the federal courts put a stop to this draconian action, more than two thousands children had been impacted. The United Nations was among the first to condemn the Trump policy of family separation. “The Trump administration’s practice of separating children from migrant families entering the United States violates their rights and international law,” the United Nations human rights office commented, and urged an immediate halt to the practice.

Time is of essence in the reunification of children with their parents. We see daily evidence that children matter, families matter, and being with your parents is a natural and humane expectation. In a statement issued by the UN’s Human Rights Council, experts said “Detention of children is puni-

tive, severely hampers their development, and in some cases may amount to torture.” They added that “Children are being used as a deterrent to irregular migration, which is unacceptable.”

Not surprisingly, finding the children to match them up with their parents has not been easy. The New York Times reported this week that “With less than a week left before the deadline (imposed by a Federal Judge in San Diego), just 364 of the separated children, or less than 15 percent, have been reunited with their families.”

It is clear that many of the children, especially those under the age of five, will have difficulty knowing their parents full name or community of origin. And while the Foster Care programs help many children whose parents demonstrated an inability to raise their children, we cannot assume that children living with strangers who may not speak the children’s home language or children placed in a group home solves the problem. The Foster Care system is already struggling to meet the needs of children whose parents cannot care for them.

There was ample confusion on how to implement the Trump policy dealing with the separation of families. American immigration agencies have created a crisis in that they placed apprehended children under the age of five in centers as far as the state of New York. As of this week, more than seventy children under the age of five do not know where their parents are. They too are lost, and the

trauma of separation is real.

Some of the children were taken to refugee centers as ICE deported their parents, most often their mothers transported in planes and buses back to the homeland. This meant, of course, leaving their children in the United States. There will be serious problems in bringing children together with their parents who may be thousands of miles away.

It is reasonable to expect many hardships for families separated by time and vast distances. And there is little time to lose, something that the American Civil Liberties Union argued before a Federal Judge in San Diego.

Much has changed in the past decade in terms of migration from Mexico and Central America. Today’s forced displacement includes more women than men. The migration patterns have also changed. The violence occurring in Central America is forcing many families to seek asylum in the United States.

In the last decade, the Pew Research Center showed that migration trends have reversed as more Mexicans leave the United States than enter. Today, Central Americans make up vast number of apprehensions by the Border Patrol and Homeland Security (ICE) officers along the 2000 mile border between Mexico and the United States.

Migration is a world-wide phenomenon. It is not unique to America. Everyday hundreds of refugees die in their attempt to seek a better life for their families. Poverty caused by drought and war in Africa sends thousand of refugees to

other countries every week. While forced migration appear to be a hopeless situation with no solution in sight, it should be noted that no country other than the United States has chosen to separate families from their children.


The United Nations, which tracks the migration of refugees and asylum world- wide, estimated more than 68 million people left their homeland in 2017. Thus forced displacement is a global issue.

Upon learning that the Trump Administration had adopted a separation of families policy, the head of the United Nations Human Rights Council stated that “Children should never be detained for reasons related to their own or their parents’ migration status. Detention is never in the best interests of the child and always constitutes a child rights violation. The UN Council called on the authorities to adopt noncustodial alternatives.

Migration is a complex phenomena and many policies have been tried. However, the American separation policy appears to have been a horrible mistake. America should be and can be a model for humane migration policies and practices. The United States can also demonstrate how to treat people from neighboring countries, who are our closest allies.

# Just a thought “Running of the Bulls”

July 14th this year was the annual running of the Bulls in Pamplona Spain. Forty-five years back in 1973, I recall backpacking Europe with some fellow international backpackers. Reminiscing about my past, I recall I showed up in Pamplona, Spain for the event on the 10th.

It was just in time for their annual week-long event. I was so excited to be in Pamplona and experience the running first hand. I had read about the popular event in school years before, and learned about the history of the celebration. I arrived by train early in the

day awaiting my opportunity to see the opening ceremonies first-hand the following day.

While in the town square that night before the official running, I was standing with my Australian friends who I was currently backpacking with, while a band was playing in the large gazebo in the town square directly in front of us. Believe it or not the city allowed backpackers like myself from all over Europe and the United States to actually camp out in the town square at night with sleeping bags during the annual event. Those who take part in the run now are not allowed to do so because so many young people have done it in the past that hotels complained.

The band was playing and singing “Black Magic Woman,” and “Oye Como Va!” To my ecstatic surprise it was America’s own Carlos Santana and his band playing. I freaked as my friends asked me who he was since they hadn’t heard of him. Joyfully I informed them that Santana was a very popular band in America at that time. In 2014 President Barack Obama awarded Carlos Santana the

President’s Award for his contributions to the music industry. Who knew? Last year Santana performed here in San Antonio. I wasn’t able to get a ticket. It would have been so cool if I did!

Thousands of people continue to flock to Pamplona for the extravaganza every year and fill the new hotels, homes and hostels to capacity. The city relented back then and allowed the backpackers to camp out wherever they could as long as they cleaned up after themselves. The town square was ideal. In the mornings hundreds of backpackers would awake to the birds chirping and the sun shining on a new adventure, compliments of Pamplona. It was definitely an adventure to rush to the public facilities and form a line!

What I didn’t know previously but learned quickly about the Running of the Bulls back then was a practice that involves running in front of a small group of cattle, typically six, of the toro bravo breed that have been let loose on a course of a sectioned-off subset of a town’s streets.

The eight-day festival of San Fermín is held in honor of Saint Fermin in Pamplona although they are also traditionally held in other places. Towns and villages across Spain, Portugal and in some cities in Mexico and southern France during the summer also host a similar festival.

The origin of this event comes from the need to transport the bulls from the off-site corrals where they had spent the night, to the bull ring where they would be killed in the evening. Youngsters would jump among them to show off their bravado. In Pamplona and other places, the six bulls in the event are still those that will be featured in the afternoon bullfight on the same day.

Spanish tradition says the true origin of the run began in northeastern Spain during the early 14th century. While transporting cattle in order to sell them at the market, men would try to speed the process by hurrying their cattle using tactics of fear and excitement. After years of this practice, the transportation and hurrying began to turn into a competition, as young

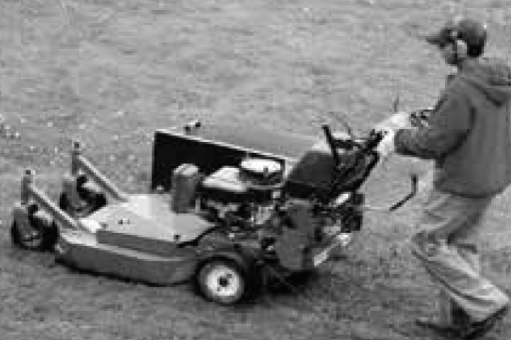
adults would attempt to race in front of the bulls and make it safely to their pens without being overtaken. When the popularity of this practice increased and was noticed more and more by the expanding population of Spanish cities, a tradition was created and stands to this very day.

During my short stay in Pamplona I was informed that every so many years some runners are killed participating in the run down the streets with bulls chasing after them. I also learned numerous runners do get hurt. While I was there, one runner was gored by a bull and died later that day from his wounds. I watched from behind the fence constructed down the town streets as the participants and bulls made their way to the bull ring. Considered a sport, it is still very dangerous and not recommended for everyone to actively participate.

However, the memory etched in my mind was standing close to Carlos Santana and hearing the future Grammy winner performing “Oye Como Va” in the town square.

As always, I write “Just a Thought.”

Aunque el Scobee Planetarium anexo a San Antonio College opera regularmente todo el año, durante las vacaciones escolares ofrece una diversión distinta que además de entretener a toda la familia abre una ventana inigualable a la imaginación de los niños, al mostrar diferentes presentaciones del universo que graban en su mente una imagen imborrable para su futuro.

Hay tres funciones regulares cada viernes con horarios de 6.30, 7.30 de la tarde y el último a las 9 de la noche con precios realmente accesibles de 4 dólares para niños de 6 a 17 años, 5 dólares para adultos, y de 4 dólares para militares y senior citizens. 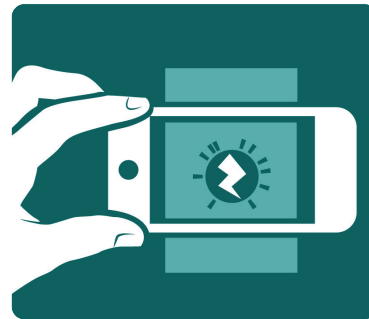

# UNEMPLOYMENT RATE IN SAN ANTONIO-NEW BRAUNFELS MSA RISES TO 3.6 PERCENT

(July 20, 2018) Workforce Solutions Alamo (WSA) released information today indicating that the unemployment rate in the eight county San Antonio-New Braunfels metropolitan statistical area (MSA) rose to 3.6 percent in June. Since this time last year, 15,500 jobs have been added, resulting in a 1.5 percent increase.

Annual and monthly job growth continues in most major industries. The greatest job growth occurred in Construction which reported 1,100 jobs (2.0%) between May and June, while Other Services came in second with an addition of 900 jobs (2.3%), Trade, Transportation, and Utilities grew by 700 jobs (0.4%), Leisure and Hospitality with 700 jobs (0.5%), Financial Activities added 500 jobs (0.6%), Manufacturing added 400 jobs (0.8%), 300 additional jobs (1.5%) were reported by Information and Mining and Logging reports 100 more jobs (1.1%). The largest losses were in Government at -2,800 jobs (-1.8%), but the industry reports an annual positive growth of 1,600 jobs (0.9%), Education and Health Services lost -2,200 jobs (-1.3%) and two reports an annual positive change of 4,100 jobs (2.5%), and Professional and Business Services lost -800 jobs (-0.6%) but maintains a positive overall

annual number of 900 jobs (0.7%) since June 2017.

Comparing the Workforce Solutions Alamo metro area to the state and nation, the Texas seasonally unadjusted (actual) unemployment rate increased to 4.2 percent in June, up from 3.7 reported in May. The nation's unadjusted (actual) unemployment rate increased to 4.2 percent, up from 3.6 percent reported in May.
