Latinas in the Military

LULAC President urges Latinas not to join the military after the disappearance of Vanessa Guillen. "We are asking all women especially Latina women or their families: Do not enlist in the army until we have assurance they will be protected and taken care of when they serve our country. And right now I just don't believe the military is capable of doing that because of what happened to Vanessa Guillen," said Domingo Garcia, the national president of the League of United Latin American Citizens, or LULAC. What do you think? Let's talk about it..

Gary Zeinert: "Obviously, what happened to this young lady was a horrible and tragic crime. However, the military is a pathway to a successful career and financial stability for a lot of people. So, advising an entire cultural group of women to avoid the military may not be the smartest thing. What has bothered me is, in my opinion, this is every bit as tragic as the George Floyd murder but up to this point I don't see the same outrage on a nationwide scale."

Barbara Ann Mendoza Mead: "Typical LULAC mentality."

Frank Burton: "Instead of saying, "don't join," we should be demanding it be fixed. Real men don't do this to women, criminals do. We need to fix the problem, not add another to the pile. Root out these people and make them pay the price for their actions. The military is an honorable path forward for many. We need to root out the bad apples just like in law enforcement. The people covering them up are just as guilty because they empower them."

Tricia Ann Ybarra: "I believe that's the wrong state of mind to be in. Don't hold them back but make us stronger. I just do not know of LULAC's way of thinking.. It's a ridiculous thing for

them to say for Hispanic women not to join! We just need to continue to stay strong and proud for serving our country. I pray for Guillen's family."

Thomas Mc: "I chose college and it paid off. I had friends that did trade school, that paid off. Many of my friends who decided on the military have issues ranging from PTSD, disabilities, and worst of constantly getting the runaround from the VA. That may not be everyone's experience but it is many. Unless minorities and soldiers of color are going to be taken care of, they should not join. I deal with stats and data daily. Look up the numbers yourself. I base what I say off the numbers and the experiences of those I know. Even the VA has done studies in racial disparity and inequality in the military. Research yourself, look at studies from NIH, CDC, etc. . Racial disparity, minority inequality in military, health care difference for veterans of minorities in the VA... Years of data on each and the numbers have everything to do with all the widespread problems."

Robbie Willis : "Why bring up anyone's color of skin regarding joining the military. None of us are taken care of properly. I am white and still fighting for my disability; but do you know what? I would proudly serve again. This has nothing to do with skin color. Bringing it up shows they are part of the problem here in the U.S. What happened to her is wrong but it has nothing to do with race except women are sexually harassed way way more than men. Numbers have no say here with this post. I don't care if you deal with numbers everyday. It has nothing to do with this. It has nothing to do with the color of your skin but lack of leadership. Why does everything have to turn into the color of someone's skin. This post was about joining the military. And until you do

you don't know how it is. I saw women sexually harassed. Not just brown or black women, all women. I saw great men of all skin colors advance and become great leaders. So this has nothing to do with skin color but ignorant men who treat women wrong. That is what this boils down to. Men that make good men like me look bad. I told my son who is in the navy, if I ever heard that he knew about a female being sexually harassed and did nothing I would beat him. I raised him right. I know I don't have to worry. Again, going on the post only, not any other issue, this has nothing to do with race. Some men are not good people and treat women wrong."

Steve A Duran Sr.: "I think the military is still a great opportunity for young people and we can not blame all branches of the military for one bad apple."

Denise Castano Wirth: "That's taking steps backwards."

John Diego Vacca: "Tell him to create more high paying jobs in the inner city of San Antonio and to bring better job training for the workforce."

Mary Svetlik Watkins: "It was the Hispanic guy doing the harassing in college ROTC. He had an affair with a cadet. The army sent him to a boot camp base where he raped women. He retired quietly."


Mike Miller: "Now you know which side of America that LULAC is taking with all the stuff going on."

Edward Kunhardt Hidalgo

Former U.S. Secretary of the Navy, Edward Kunhardt Hidalgo was born in Mexico City in 1912. He immigrated to the U.S. and was naturalized in 1936, enjoying prolific military and law careers. He holds degrees from Columbia Law School and the Universidad Nacional Autonoma de Mexico and practiced with the finest law firms in New York, Paris and Mexico City. During World War II, he served as an air combat intelligence officer, special assistant to the Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal and as a member of the Eberstadt Commission on the Unification of the Military Services. He also was special assistant to Secretary of the Navy Paul Nitze and later general counsel to the U.S. Information Agency. In 1979, Hidalgo was appointed Secretary of the Navy by President Carter.

Denise Pintor is a self taught artist whose exquisite paintings range from landscapes, vintage lowrider cars and Airstream vehicles, to portraits of young charros and Escaramuza [women who ride horses in the Charreadas]. She also captures the essence of Texas and surrounding states, traveling widely to find examples of a disappearing rural society which she believes is important to capture and preserve in art.

Pintor grew up in South Texas in a community rich

with Hispanic traditions and culture. In addition to attending rodeo and charro events, she took a great interest in the car hobbies of family members and neighbors who spent time with their lowriders and vintage cars.

In her teen years, she gained a passion for the arts and interior design. In an effort to learn more about the arts, she enrolled in several summer classes at the Bellas Artes de San Luis Potosí in the early 1980s. She enjoyed these classes in Mexico and pursued her love of the arts by enrolling at the University of

Texas at San Antonio in the mid 1980s.

Pintor worked in several business fields following her UTSA graduation, but in time she decided to pursue her love for interior design and decorative arts. Much of her career included working with custom builders whose projects required faux finishes and the utilization of plaster. Her work in historical restoration took her to many parts of Texas.

After 25 years of decorative arts and interior design work, she retired and turned her attention to painting,



traveling, and community advocacy. She is constantly painting, but makes time to advocate for her community. The rapid gentrification of her Eastside neighborhood, as well as rising racial and economic disparities in San Antonio, have pushed her

into political activism. Her artist friends admire her social values as well as her mission to paint and work daily to make a better world.

Art During the Time of the Pandemic and Protest: Latino Stories

There is great uncertainty about the pandemic--no one knows how many lives will be affected, how long it will last, and how our lives will look in the aftermath. We are not even sure if there is a "normal life" in store for us anytime in the near future.

While the pandemic crisis appears to be receding in some U.S. communities and lockdowns are somewhat in decline, that is not the case in Texas where the infected numbers continue to rise. San Antonio is one of the many large cities where Covid-19 cases increased this past week.

Adding to the anguish caused by the coronavirus, the outrage and grief over the vivid videos of police brutality has the entire world engaged in marches against violence and inequality. In the week after the video showing the brutal killing of George Flyod, protesters marched in more than 140 U.S. cities. Protestors also marched in solidarity with the Black Lives Matter movement in Europe's main capitals as well as in cities of New Zealand and Australia. How the pandemic and the rise of political protest is affecting the Texas Latino art community is the focus of this essay.

The art world is in turmoil--that is a reality. Many museums and galleries remain closed. Art sales are down significantly. Nonetheless, most Latino artists I spoke to remain optimistic and are currently preparing works for both virtual exhibitions and gallery openings. They



have resigned themselves to remaining sheltered in place. While constrained by the lockdown, they remain determined to stay active and strive daily for creativity.

The pandemic and resulting economic downturn, as well the new protests against police brutality, combined to disrupt local artist Albert Gonzales' world of art. He had just put a pause on painting with the birth of a new baby when the Covid-19 crisis began. His days were filled with child care and household duties as a stay-at-home father.

But soon, not having the normal access to fellow artists and galleries led him to moments of anxiety and internal turmoil. Married to an artist [Caroline Gonzales] made the transition to quarantine easier. They adjusted and now both go to their studios on South Flores with their baby in tow.

Albert Gonzales struggled with how to lend his artistic voice to the Black Lives Matter protest movement

and one day emerged from the studio with an image of a sole black rose on a stem. His title for the painting, 846 is the time, 8 minutes and 46 seconds, that a police officer knelt on the neck of George Floyd. I spoke by phone to Gonzales on a Saturday afternoon as he settled into his studio. He was more concerned about how to make an eloquent political statement about Floyd than about how he would sell his art. He is feeling creative again and the anxiety of the past has eased. He is ready to create more art.

Surviving the pandemic appears simpler for those who still have fulfilling day jobs or recently retired from successful careers. My high school friend, Tim Palomera, is the latter case. Tim is a retired architect who turned to ceramic arts as a second career. He works on this art everyday, although he acknowledges that sales are down.

Among Palomera's most popular creative pieces are those designed for home



and garden. They include religious objects such as crosses and bowls with the Virgin of Guadalupe image. Galleries that sold his work, however, are temporarily closed, and the weekend art fairs where he often presented his art work are a thing of the past--at least for now. He is spending time with historical architectural postcards and books and looks forward to devoting more time soon to ceramic art.

Denise Pintor Homer spent much of her life in the construction industry and today is able to spend her retirement years painting and doing community work. She has work space at the Millhouse Studios in San Antonio with 30 other artists, most of whom work in oil and acrylic painting or wood and metal work. The pandemic and subsequent economic downturn gave Denise added reasons to champion affordable housing, city support for the arts, and civic contribution to art projects.

While Denise has increased

her political activism over the past three months, she still makes time to work in her home studio and has recently returned to her public work space. She is also one of the contributing artists who joined the "Paint the Park" project that I organized at Brackenridge Park. Modelled after early artistic efforts at Central Park in New York City, we encouraged park visitors to take note of the creative efforts by San Antonio artists who paint in "plein air" with the goal of sharing their own interpretation of Brackenridge Park landscapes and life.

We are living in troubled times, and many Latino artists have been challenged to do things differently. Their stay at home experience has taught them patience, but also given them the opportunity to invest in their emotional and mental growth. Many will take advantage of the time alone to reflect on how they can be better artists as well as better human beings--the latter is a worthwhile goal for all of us.

Nos damos cuenta de que sin una educación de calidad nuestros hijos están condenados. ¡El factor perdido son nuestros padres! Durante los últimos meses nos hemos reunido con los padres, encuestando a los padres y recibiendo su opinión sobre cómo se sienten acerca del sistema educativo en San Antonio. También hemos estado compartiendo los resultados de nuestra serie web nacional con la poderosa red de padres. Los padres con los que hemos estado hablando exigen lo siguiente:

1. Nuestros hijos han perdido mucho aprendizaje estos últimos meses. Pero seamos reales.

Muchas de nuestras escuelas estaban bajo rendimiento antes de que ocurriera algo de esto y muchos de nuestros hijos estaban muy atrás de donde

tenían que estar antes de que ocurriera esta crisis.

- Cada estudiante recibe un plan personalizado para la recuperación académica antes del 1 de noviembre. Los planes deben provenir de una evaluación del

aprendizaje de los estudiantes que se da después del comienzo del año escolar 2020-21 y deben incluir la opinión de las familias y los pasos exactos que las escuelas tomarán para abordar cualquier brecha de aprendizaje que exista.

2. Cierre la brecha digital antes de que las escuelas vuelvan a abrir. Antes de que un centavo

de nuestro dinero de impuestos se gaste en edificios, salarios, contratación, etc., hagamos primero lo primero.

- Cada estudiante necesita un dispositivo conectado cargado con los programas de aprendizaje/software del distrito. También es necesario proporcionar

recursos de capacitación para los padres sobre cómo acceder y cuidar los dispositivos.

- Pero los dispositivos no son nada sin acceso a Internet. Los Distritos deben proporcionar acceso a Internet sin costo/bajo costo a todas las familias.

- Si un distrito no es capaz de proporcionar buenos programas de instrucción remota, no Qhaga que nuestras familias sufran. Se nos debe dar la opción de elegir un programa en otro distrito, con nuestros fondos siguiendo a nuestros hijos.

Esperamos que se una a MindShiftED firmando electrónicamente esta declaración de apoyo. 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Civic Engagement Group Launches Major Campaign to Register the Rising American Electorate in Texas

COVID-19 Pandemic Increases Need for Mail-based Voter Registration Programs

The Voter Participation Center (VPC) and its partner group the Center for Voter Information (CVI), are mailing 373,518 voter registration applications to people in Texas this month as part of their largest-ever campaign to register voters ahead of the historic 2020 election.

More than 6.7 million people who can vote in Texas are not yet registered, according to the "Voting and Registration in the Election of November 2018" supplement to the U.S. Census, and 83% of them are members of the Rising American Electorate: young people, people of color and unmarried women. People in

this group often move between elections and register and vote at lower rates than the rest of the population.

As states implement stay-at-home or shelter-in-place orders and millions of Americans self-isolate because of the coronavirus pandemic, mail-based voter registration efforts have never been more important. VPC and CVI run the nation's largest mail-based voter registration program, and their work is crucial today. VPC and CVI are significantly increasing their efforts during the coronavirus crisis, to ensure that historically disadvantaged communities can exercise their democracy by registering to vote

by mail and requesting vote-by-mail ballots online.

"With COVID-19 impacting elections, we cannot take any citizen for granted and must do all we can to increase turnout in this uncertain time. The future of our democracy is at stake," said Page Gardner, the groups' Founder and Board Chair. "We have a major opportunity to close the gap on voter registration and make sure the electorate is as representative as the country as a whole. That's why it's critical for prospective voters to register and make sure their registrations are up to date."

VPC and CVI mail registration applications to unregistered individuals, along with pre-addressed

envelopes to make it easy to send completed forms directly to local election officials. People who want to register online, have questions about the mailing, or who want to be excluded from future mailings can visit voterparticipation.org.

Since 2004, the organizations have helped register more than 4.6 million voters nationally, including more than 272,941 people who applied to register in Texas. This month, VPC and CVI will be sending nearly 12 million pieces of mail to prospective voters in 22 states.

VPC and CVI are in touch with election officials months ahead of all mailings. The organizations make sample mailings and

in-depth information about their programs available online.

Who's in the Rising American Electorate in Texas?

The Rising American Electorate makes up 13.2 million people in Texas meaning this group represents 72% of the state's voting eligible population.

Young people (18 - 38): 7.2 million people, or 39% of people who can vote.

People of color: 8.8 million people, or 48% of people who can vote, including 5.5 million Latinos and 2.4 million African-Americans.

Unmarried women: 4.9 million people, or 27% of people who can vote.

Local veteran program expanding its reach, changes name to Texas Veterans Network

The formerly known TXServes San Antonio program, overseen by the Alamo Area Council of Governments (AACOG), has changed its name to Texas Veterans Network and acquired an additional fourteen counties into its service area. The program will remain under the AACOG umbrella of services, and will offer a physical presence in the counties surrounding Laredo and Corpus Christi.

The Texas Veterans Network Program, made possible through funding from the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC), aims to be the state's premier veterans' service provider. The network brings together Veteran Service Organizations, non-profit, and governmental organizations who provide direct services to veterans and acts as the front door to a web of available supports for our veteran community and their families. By contacting the Texas Veterans Network, veterans may find assistance for themselves and their families in a range of needs, including housing, transportation, medical, nutrition, and even employment.

AACOG has been operating the program in San Antonio for the past 3 years as TXServes San Antonio, and in that time has compiled a network of over 100 organizations who can collectively meet over 70 different needs to enhance a veteran's quality of life. Since its inception, the program has processed 6,300 service requests to over 4,400 veterans or veteran family-members. The expansion will provide the opportunity to recruit even more service providers – located in the Laredo and Corpus Christi areas – and service these two additional regions, which are also home to significant veteran populations.

Gary Timpson, Lead Veteran Programs Coordinator, expressed his excitement by stating "The TXServes platform ignited and spread like a wildfire – our veterans, military members, and their families were thrilled to get the attention, response, and care they deserve. As we transition into Texas Veterans Network and expand into South Texas, the opportunity for us to continue changing these individuals, and their families', lives has our entire staff very motivated."

Texas Veterans Network welcomes veterans of all eras, eligibility, and discharge status their spouses, or children may qualify for services. Requests for assistance can be made by visiting www.TXVeteransNetwork.com, or by contacting the Texas Veterans Network at (888) 724-8387.

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


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La Nueva Instalación De Arte Público Del Departamento De Arte Y Cultura Conecta El Centro De La Ciudad Con Otros Distritos Del Consejo

El Departamento de Arte y Cultura y su División de Arte Público revelaron hoy un público barandilla de arte en el River Walk Public Art Garden, cerca de la intersección de las calles Market y Alamo. Titulada “Espacios Verdes en Market Street”, la baranda de acero pintada se asienta sobre un muro de contención con vista al Paseo del Río y utiliza creativamente cortes en acero para mostrar la flora encontrada en el Paseo del Río y la fauna nativa de San Antonio.

“Green Spaces at Market Street”, creado por los artistas de San Antonio Ashley Mireles y Cade Bradshaw, junto con Stephen Stimson Studio Landscape Architects, replica las dos persianas de observación de animales del dúo de artistas que debutarán en el Robert LB Tobin Land Bridge en Phil Hardberger Park, ubicado en los distritos municipales 8 y 9. Las persianas permitirán a los visitantes ver de forma segura la vida silvestre mientras disfrutan de los elementos artísticos de las estructuras decorativas de acero. La finalización del Puente Terrestre está programada para el otoño de 2020.

“El Puente Terrestre es el único puente de este tipo y está justo aquí en San Antonio”, dijo el concejal del Distrito 8, Manny Peláez. “El proyecto ‘Espacios verdes en Market Street’ es una oportunidad perfecta para atraer a los visitantes de River Walk a explorar fuera del centro de la ciudad y aprender cuánto tiene para ofrecerles nuestra ciudad”.

“Green Spaces at Market Street” es el primero de una serie de proyectos de conectividad en el River Walk Public Art Garden ubicado en el centro de Market Street, entre las calles Alamo y

Bowie. El River Walk Public Art Garden brinda a sus visitantes la oportunidad de experimentar la escena artística de clase mundial de San Antonio en un ambiente al aire libre, al tiempo que aprende sobre las instalaciones de arte público en toda la ciudad a través de piezas rotativas y permanentes.
