Nydia Velazquez

Born to a hard-working family in Puerto Rico in 1953, Nydia Margarita Velazquez inherited her father's passion for politics. In 1983, she began working as a special assistant to former U.S. Representative Edolphus Towns. The following year, she was appointed to the New York City Council to fill Councilman Luis Olmedo's vacancy. With this appointment, Velazquez became the first Latina to serve on the council. In 1992, she declared her candidacy for the newly created 12th Congressional District in New York City. Paving the way with a grassroots campaign and the support of Rev. Jesse Jackson and union leader Dennis Rivera, Velazquez became the nation's first Puerto Rican woman elected to the U.S. House of Representatives.

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Latino Health in the Time of the Pandemic

The June 28, 2020 article “Learning from Hispanic Americans” by New York Times opinion writer Nicholas Kristof got my attention. Kristof explored how the Latino social fabric is helping those in need during the pandemic crisis. As a start, he quoted researchers interested in the “Hispanic Paradox,” who have found Latinos enjoy a “life expectancy of 81.8 years, compared with 78.5 for whites and 74.9 years for blacks.” It is a paradox, Kristol offers, because the “disadvantaged normally live shorter lives.”

In addition to living longer, Kristol concluded from studies dating back to 1974 that Latinos “have lower suicide rates than whites, are less likely to drink alcohol, are less likely to die from drug overdoses and, at least among immigrants, appear to commit fewer crimes.”

David Hays-Bautista, a UCLA scholar who has spent the last 35 years studying Latino health issues, may well be one of the scholars that gave Kristof insights on Latino health issues. Hays-Bautista is perhaps the first scholar to offer that the health data for Latinos presented a paradox. He commented, “Latinos across the nation have less income,

less education, less access to health care and yet we have nationally 30% lower mortality for heart disease, 35% lower cancer mortality, 25% stroke mortality, 60% lower respiratory disease, a 30% lower cause of death rate compared to non Hispanic whites. The one exception is diabetes.”

I met Hays-Bautista in the mid 1980s when he accepted a position in the School of Medicine at UCLA. He was completing his first book, *The Burden of Support: The Young Latino Population in an Aging American Society* published in 1988. At the time I was working closely with UT Austin LBJ professor, Dr. Jorge Chapa, a former graduate student of Hays-Bautista at UC Berkeley. As a Vice Provost at UT Austin, I had consulted with Chapa and fellow UT History professor David Montejano on the “top ten percent” concept which they first proposed and which was eventually accepted as an admission policy by UT Austin and other Texas universities.

Hays-Bautista, Chapa, and Montejano were a new generation of Latino scholars. Their ability to use large U.S.Census data to address Latino social disparities set them apart. Hays-Bautista

used 1980-1990 census data to show that Mexican immigrants had better health outcomes than second and third generation Mexican Americans. Chapa used census data to show higher education enrollment disparities for Latinos.

We are living in new and frightening different times. Covid-19 strikes healthy and unhealthy individuals. Its pathogen is not partial to any one race or ethnic group. But Latinos have a higher infection rate compared to Whites because they work in essential industries where they are often in close proximity to many other co-workers and where they do not always have the sufficient masks, gloves, and cleaning solutions critical to prevent infection.

According to a recent June 12 report from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention [CDC], age-adjusted hospitalization rates are highest among non-Hispanic, American Indian, or Alaska Native, and non-Hispanic black persons, followed by Hispanic or Latino persons. The CDC report noted Hispanic or Latino persons have a hospitalization rate approximately 4 times that of non-Hispanic white persons. While this is an alarming

rate, there does not appear to be any special efforts by state or federal officials to add additional resources to lessen the Latino health threat. Additionally, a shortage of Latino nurses and doctors is one of the most pressing issues during this pandemic.

For over twenty years Hays-Bautista has been expressing concerns over the low number of Latinos in the medical fields. He commented to Latino Leaders Magazine: that the Latino community lacks access to health care and that there are not enough doctors and nurses and other health care professionals who speak Spanish.

Until recently there were few Latino university scholars or administrators who could address the low number of Latinos studying in highly competitive medical schools. We are encouraged by the work of Dr. Francisco Cigarroa, who as president of the University of Texas Health Science Center [UTHSC], allowed high performing students in the health sciences at most Texas universities to apply to the San Antonio medical or dental school after three years of college. This innovative policy has helped in the recruitment of Latinos, many

of whom have been able to save thousands of dollars by attending one less year of college before entering medical school.

It is certainly true that the Latino social fabric is strong. There is strength in the Latino family structure and in Latino communities where religion and culture provide powerful binding forces. However, much more systemic change is needed. There are numerous uncertainties in this pandemic era which is now responsible for more 130,000 American deaths in just the last four months. Our nation needs a vaccine. We also need health care insurance to assist those who need testing but may not have the funds to pay for it. We know that hospitalization is expensive. Even preventive care is not affordable to the majority of families without programs like Obamacare. Lastly, we need to hold our politicians accountable. This is not the time for six-hour lines to get tested for Covid-19 or to vote. This is not a time for the Republican administration to launch their third challenge to the Affordable Care Act in the Supreme Court in their attempt to take away access to health insurance needed by millions of Americans.

1) Los oficiales de inmigración aclararon que, en relación a COVID-19, toda persona puede hacerse pruebas, recibir atención de prevención y recibir tratamiento para combatir el COVID-19 sin temor a consecuencias debido a su estado migratorio.

2) Usted puede ver a

un médico aunque no tenga seguro médico. Si no tiene un doctor, llame a un centro de salud de la comunidad local para obtener ayuda. Encuentre un doctor en: <https://findahealthcenter.hrsa.gov>

3) Si todos los miembros de su unidad familiar tienen un número de seguro social y usted gana menos de \$75,000 por año, podría ser elegible para un pago único en efectivo de \$1,200 por adulto y \$500 por niño/a.

4) La Ley CARES amplía el seguro de desempleo para incluir a los contratistas independientes y para que dure más tiempo, pero de todos modos necesita tener

permiso para trabajar en los Estados Unidos.

5) El P-EBT (siglas en inglés de “Pandemic EBT”) es un nuevo programa de Transferencia Electrónica de Beneficios de asistencia nutricional (por la pandemia) que permite a los Estados brindar beneficios de ayuda para alimentos por alrededor de \$114 por niño/a, cada mes, para las familias que han

perdido el acceso a las comidas escolares gratis o de precio reducido. Está disponible ahora en más de 40 estados para cualquier persona elegible, sin importar su estado migratorio.

6) Si recibe el pago de estímulo económico

(stimulus payment). seguro de desempleo, pruebas y tratamientos para COVID-19, o el P-EBT (“Pandemic EBT”), ello no será usado en su contra en caso que se deba determinar si se considera “carga pública”.

Eso significa que aplicar para estos programas no impactará negativamente su capacidad de obtener la residencia legal en el futuro.

Texas Woman With Compromised Immune System Advocates for Expanding Vote by Mail: 'I Shouldn't Have To Die To Make My Voice Heard'

Last week, the United States hit a new record in the coronavirus pandemic, with more than 3.3 million confirmed cases and more than 137,000 fatalities. This new record has once again renewed conversations over the importance and time-sensitive nature of expanding mail-in voting, as experts predict that the virus could negatively affect the safety and integrity of the election in November.

In a new video released today by the Center for American Progress Action Fund, Marisa Harding of Austin, Texas, who has lived with multiple sclerosis for 20 years, advocates for expanding vote by mail and says that she should not have to risk her life in order to exercise her right to vote. This comes as the state of Texas continues to surpass 10,000 daily coronavirus hospitalizations.

"I've been diagnosed with multiple sclerosis for approximately 20 years. I have a right to vote," she says. "I shouldn't have to die to make my voice heard."

According to a recent poll, 64 percent of Americans believe that states should allow voters to vote by mail or by absentee ballot this November. While polling shows overwhelming support nationally, it also reveals a political divide over this issue. The poll shows that Republicans are in fact more likely to believe that vote by mail will lead to voter fraud; however, this narrative, which has echoed in conservative media for months, has been debunked numerous times. For Harding, this election is too critical for her to sit out, but she worries about what will happen if she is forced to vote in person.

"I have two children, 18 and 17. And I need to stay alive for them. My future, my everything, is determined by whether I vote this November," she says.

SOLICITUD Y DECISIÓN PRELIMINAR. Ciudad de Boerne, 447 North Main Street, Boerne, Texas 78006, ha solicitado a la Comisión de Calidad Ambiental del Estado de Texas (TCEQ) una renovación del Sistema de Eliminación de Descargas de Contaminantes de Texas (TPDES) el Permiso No. WQ0010066001 (EPA I.D. No. TX0024465) para autorizar la descarga de aguas residuales tratadas en un volumen que no sobrepasa un flujo promedio diario de 1,200,000 galones por día. La TCEQ recibió esta solicitud el 29 de Agosto del 2019.

La planta está ubicada en 350 South Eßer Road, Boerne, en el Condado de Kendall, Texas. El efluente tratado es descargado al Riachuelo de Currey; de allí al Riachuelo Superior de Cibolo en el Segmento No. 1908 de la Cuenca del Río San Antonio. Los usos no clasificados de las aguas receptoras son limitados, usos de la vida acuática para Riachuelo Superior de Currey. Los usos designados para el Segmento No. 1908 son recreación de contacto primario, abastecimiento de agua potable, protección del acuífero, y elevados de vida acuática.

El Director Ejecutivo de la TCEQ ha completado la revisión técnica de la solicitud y ha preparado un borrador del permiso. El borrador del permiso, si es aprobado, establecería las condiciones bajo las cuales la instalación debe operar. El Director Ejecutivo ha tomado una decisión preliminar que si este permiso es emitido, cumple con todos los requisitos normativos y legales. La solicitud del permiso, la decisión preliminar del Director Ejecutivo y el borrador del permiso están disponibles para leer y copiar en Ayuntamiento de Boerne, vestíbulo delantero, 447 North Main Street, Boerne, Texas. La TCEQ realiza una reunión pública si el Director Ejecutivo determina que hay un grado de interés público suficiente en la solicitud o si un legislador local lo pide. Una reunión pública no es una audiencia administrativa de lo contencioso.

OPORTUNIDAD DE UNA AUDIENCIA ADMINISTRATIVA DE LO CONTENCIOSO. Después del plazo para presentar comentarios públicos, el Director Ejecutivo considerará todos los comentarios apropiados y preparará una respuesta a todo los comentarios públicos esenciales, pertinentes, o significativos. **A menos que la solicitud haya sido referida directamente a una audiencia administrativa de lo contencioso, la respuesta a los comentarios y la decisión del Director Ejecutivo sobre la solicitud serán enviados por correo a todos los que presentaron un comentario público y a las personas que están en la lista para recibir avisos sobre esta solicitud. Si se reciben comentarios, el aviso también proveerá instrucciones para pedir una reconsideración de la decisión del Director Ejecutivo y para pedir una audiencia administrativa de lo contencioso.** Una audiencia administrativa de lo contencioso es un procedimiento legal similar a un procedimiento legal civil en un tribunal de distrito del estado.

PARA SOLICITAR UNA AUDIENCIA DE CASO IMPUGNADO, USTED DEBE INCLUIR EN SU SOLICITUD LOS SIGUIENTES DATOS: su nombre, dirección, y número de teléfono; el nombre del solicitante y número del permiso; la ubicación y distancia de su propiedad/actividad con respecto a la instalación; una descripción específica de la forma cómo usted sería afectado adversamente por el sitio de una manera no común al público en general; una lista de todas las cuestiones de hecho en disputa que usted presente durante el período de comentarios; y la declaración “[Yo/nosotros] solicito/solicitamos una audiencia de caso impugnado”. Si presenta la petición para una audiencia de caso impugnado de parte de un grupo o asociación, debe identificar una persona que representa al grupo para recibir correspondencia en el futuro; identificar el nombre y la dirección de un miembro del grupo que sería afectado

adversamente por la planta o la actividad propuesta; proveer la información indicada anteriormente con respecto a la ubicación del miembro afectado y su distancia de la planta o actividad propuesta; explicar cómo y porqué el miembro sería afectado; y explicar cómo los intereses que el grupo desea proteger son pertinentes al propósito del grupo.

Después del cierre de todos los períodos de comentarios y de petición que aplican, el Director

Ejecutivo enviará la solicitud y cualquier petición para reconsideración o para una audiencia de caso impugnado a los Comisionados de la TCEQ para su consideración durante una reunión programada de la Comisión. La Comisión sólo puede conceder una solicitud de una audiencia de caso impugnado sobre los temas que el solicitante haya presentado en sus comentarios oportunos que no fueron retirados posteriormente. Si se concede una audiencia, el tema de la audiencia estará limitado a cuestiones de hecho en disputa o cuestiones mixtas de hecho y de derecho relacionadas a intereses pertinentes y materiales de calidad del agua que se hayan presentado durante el período de comentarios. 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

She is currently working on various scholarly book projects, including one that documents and examines the history of settler colonial public celebrations like Fiesta San Antonio in barrio schools.

As a public intellectual, Saldaña bridges community and academia through innovative teaching, public scholarship, and professional service to the field and the community. She is actively involved in the statewide organizing efforts to expand MAS in K-12 schools and currently serves on the board of the Esperanza Peace & Justice Center which promotes social justice through cultural arts programming and historical preservation. She also serves on the board of the National Institute on Mexican American History of Civil Rights – the first institute of its kind in the U.S. dedicated to researching and documenting historic and contemporary civil rights milestones in education, voting rights, economic justice, and other civil rights forged in San Antonio and South Texas.
