Becky Hammon dirigirá Las Vegas Aces en Temporada WNBA 2022

Becky Hammon, entrenadora asistente del timonel en jefe Gregg Popovich en la prestigiada franquicia Spurs de San Antonio (Los Spurs), recientemente fue confirmada para ser la dirigente principal del club Las Vegas Aces.

Hammon, nativa de Rapid City, South Dakota, de estatura 5-6, guardia estelar, con los equipos Liberty de Nueva York (Conferencia del Este en el circuito WNBA), y San Antonio Silver Stars, en la Conferencia del Oeste.

Hammon, curso estudios superiores en Colorado State, dónde vistio el uniforme del plantel en el baloncesto universitario, siendo en 1999 con los Honores All-American, cuando sin ser incluida en el tradicional WNBA Draft, como agente libre fue firmada por el equipo New York Liberty, equipo al qué ayudó a competir en tres finales durante sus primeros años jugando en La Gran Manzana.

Con Liberty Hammon fue elegido a los juegos de estrellas durante, 2003, 2005 y 2006. Siendo posteriormente intercambiada a San Antonio, dónde impuso marca de 18.8 puntos por partido. Con 5.0 asistencias por cotejo, lo cual la ayudó a ser elegido para su participación en el WNBA All-Star Game.

Fue en 2008, cuando Hammon, guió a Silver Stars a la disputa de su primera gran final WNBA Finals, ante Detroit Shock qué logró coronarse.

Silver Stars sé clasificó en siete series de playoffs durante Hammon capitaneando el equipo, siendo posteriormente elegida a los partidos WNBA All-Star en las campañas de 2009 y 2011.

Hammon, sé retiró dentro de la franquicia cómo líder en asistencias con promedio de 5.1 en asistencias y encestes con average de 15.6, así cómo líder en la WNBA en encestes de tiros libres con promedio de 89.7.

En 2015 Hammon fue inmortalizada en el Colorado Sports Hall of Fame y en 2018 en San Antonio Sports Hall of Fame.

En boletín oficial informativo de Spurs Sports and Entertainment (SS&E), sé dijo lo siguiente: Las Vegas Aces, con su presidente Nikki Fargas, anuncio el contrato de Becky Hammon, asistente del entrenador Gregg Popovich, quién ostenta seis elecciones al WNBA All-Star Game. Quién será la entrenadora en jefe del equipo Aces.

"Estamos emocionados de poder tener a Becky en su regresó con la franquicia Aces ahora cómo entrenadora", dijo Fargas. "Su éxito en el deporte del baloncesto tanto cómo jugadora y coach. Qué la ha covertido en ser la mejor en todas las posibilidades. Tenemos la mejor alineación con gran talento en la WNBA y Becky es la persona quién es la mejor para guiar a nuestro equipo", añadió Fargas.

"Estoy agradecida porqué regresó a la WNBA y agradecida con Mark Davis y Nikki Fargas, quiénes tienen la confianza en mi para dirigir a Aces", dijo Hammon. Quién añadió lo siguiente. "Aquí es dónde pertenesco. Estoy emocionada de ser quién respondera a esa confianza qué sé me ha dado para dirigir con éxito al selecto grupo de jugadoras qué expondran sus respectivos talentos".

La iniciativa de elegir a Hammon, fue durante el retiró de su playera en septiembre 13, 2021. Durante la celebración del 25 aniversario de la franquicia qué contó con ex jugadoras de Utah y San Antonio, quiénes fueron parte de incrementar la calidad de juego en la franquicia y la Liga.

"Esa ceremonia fue exi-

tosamente oara para la organización de Aces. Desde el momento qué conoci a Becky, no perdí la esperanza, de qué algún día ella sé uniera a nuestra familia. Nunca lo imágene qué sucediera tan pronto", dijo Mark Davis.

Hammon, reemplazara al entrenador Bill Laimbeer, quién dirigio a Aces durante cuatro años en Las Vegas, quién llevó al equipo a cladificarse en tres semifinales de la WNBA. Así cómo a la 2020 WNBA Finals.

Laimbeer, seguirá trabajando en la organización, tanto en la construcción del equipo 2022, agencia libre y periodos en las siguientes semana.

Fargas, agradeció el excelente trabajo de Bill Laimbeer.

Hammon jugó 16 temporadas en la WNBA, con 8 jugando en San Antonio al qué dirigio a su única gran final. En agosto 5 de 2014, Gregg Popovich entrenador en jefe del plantel San Antonio Spurs, empleó de tiempo completo a Hammon, quién sé convirtió en la primera mujer en la Liga

NBA en ocupar el puesto de entrenadora asistente.

Hammon en Julio 3, 2015, cómo entrenadora en jefe en la NBA Summer League guió a Spurs al campeonato, convirtiendose en la primera mujer en realizar la mencionada hazaña.

En menos de un año, Hammon fue la primera mujer en ser parte del equipo All-Star, y en diciembre 30, 2020, al ser Popovich botado en partido jugado en San Antonio vs Los Ángeles, Hammon sé hizo cargo del equipo para convertirse en la primera mujer en ser la head coach en la historia de la NBA.

"Esta es gran oportunidad para ella, para mostrar sus habilidades y ello ayudará a Aces, para seguir su sistema y cultura", dijo Popovich.

"Tengo muchos recuerdos y experiencias con Stars y Spurs. He aprendido bastante al lado de Pop. Ello me ayudará en el futuro", indicó Hammon. En la foto aparece Becky Hammon en acción vistiendo el uniforme del equipo SanAntonio Silver Stars. (Foto de Franco).





Richard Armendariz: Teacher, Artist, Borderlands Interpreter

Growing up in El Paso, Texas "with Juarez, Mexico in my backyard," Latino artist Richard Armendariz found himself "saturated with a mix of romanticism for the new and old West American cultures and the iconography of an

ancestral past." The mystique of the border region greatly influenced him, he added, "including mesas, honky-tonks, and big skies reaching as far as the eye can see."

Armendariz grew up in a bilingual-bicultural world where family and schoolmates freely expressed themselves in mixed English and Spanish sentences. Today, Armendariz utilizes this border language, often referred to as code-switching, to add personal and cultural meaning to his paintings. Examples of his works with bilingual titles include "Ya Me Voy a Therapy," "Tu Eres O

No Eres Mi Baby, "as well as "The Way A Mi Corazon Es Un Bumpy Road."

Armendariz's interest in art began in the

mid-seventies when he took up drawing in pre-school. His active drawing and sketching continued through his teenage years. As a college student at UTSA, Armendariz knew he was attracted to the field of art, but his initial interests included art history and art therapy. He did not think seriously about making creative art until he began his Master of Fine Arts studies at the University of Colorado, Boulder.

Once Armendariz began to paint, he relied on his borderland experiences as a way of expressing the topics of interest to him. Armendariz strongly identifies with both

American and Mexican cultures. He is especially fascinated with the people and animal life

of the Rio Grande, the Mexican Sierras, and the arid landscape of West Texas.

Armendariz, who joined the University of Texas-San Antonio Art Department faculty in 2004, notes that his teaching and work is a result of coupling "traditional

techniques of painting, drawing, and printmaking with non-traditional methods of drawing or carving to achieve my esthetic."

In 2017 Armendariz was selected as the first

Artist-in-Residence for The DoSeum, San Antonio's Children's Museum. Armendariz's elaborate museum design, "The Dream Keeper," included the creation of "a space of 'dreams' where children would relax and experience the exhibit both as spectators and as protagonists." With the assistance of a local arts collective, 'Art to the Third Power,' that included artists Kim Bishop, Paul Karam, and Luis Valderas, Armendariz created over 50, 8-foot-high prints to build an "external facade with a surprise internal forest."

On a smaller scale in his studio, Armendariz's favorite medium is birchwood panels. He works with power tools to carve and burn his images into the surface of the wood as a base for his paintings and prints. He explained to art historian Teresa Eckmann that he has a preference for images "that have a cultural, biographical, and historical lineage."

Armendariz also acknowledges that "Romanticism for the American landscape and the hybridization of Mexican, American, and indigenous cultures" often informed the content of his work. Examples of this are his large wood-carved paintings of a curandero and the buffalo of

the western plains. There is also an abundant portrayal of birds, rabbits, bears, buffalo, and

coyotes carved into birchwood, all representing the past and present of his life in the Texas-Mexico borderlands.

In a stunning woodblock portrait of fellow El Paso artist and early mentor Luis Jimenez, Armendariz created

images painted on Jimenez's face to tell of major episodes in Jimenez's life. The bronco structure that fell on Luis Jimenez and killed him appears on the left side of the portrait. On Jimenez's forehead, Armendariz painted an image of Talaca, a skeleton head representing Mexican-Indian imagery of death. On the bottom of Jimenez's face is an image of a raven, a pet bird that Jimenez kept in his studio in Hondo, New Mexico. Armendariz, a friend of Jimenez, had visited the studio and had seen the raven, whom he described as quite mean.

Armendariz's art celebrates

the Texas Borderlands, a region that extends 830 miles from El Paso to Brownsville, nearly 200 miles on both sides of the U.S.-Mexico international boundary. Armendariz told art historian Eckmann that his work is "like the Southwest, something that looks like where I came from, a Bordertown." He is also often drawn to conceptual themes "involving power dynamics, sentimental love, as well as passionate and explosive love."

Armendariz creates many of his works with historical and contemporary commentary in mind. He noted that one woodetched "painting depicted a condor and eagle locked in an embrace falling from the sky. In the composition, the birds of prey, symbolizing the United States and Mexico, will rise or fall together." His romanticism about the West is reflected in

one painting with the title "Confessions of a Singin' Vaquero," shown at Blue Star Contemporary Art Gallery in 2020.

Armendariz's "Exodus" woodblock print, diptych ED of 5, 37" x 85", will be in the opening show of the new Cheech Museum in Riverside, Ca. in the Fall of 2022. His work is in the permanent collections of the San Antonio Museum of Art, the McNay Art Museum, the Denver Art Museum, and Ruby City in San Antonio, Texas. In addition, his work appears at the Bush International Airport. Armendariz also participated in numerous international exhibits, including Valdivia, Chile; Cuernavaca, Mexico; Manaus, Amazonas, Brazil; Bogota, Columbia; Bethlehem, Palestine; Oaxaca, Mexico; Berlin, Germany; Beijing, China; Sarajevo, Bosnia; and Guatemala City, Guatemala.

GET informed, GET engaged, and (if at all possible) GET out to vote

Texas podcasters Roy Aguillon, Kimiya Factory and Ryan Thompson came together recently to chat about what's in the news and on their minds. Their year end episode of the GET It podcast, numbered fortyeight in the series, shines with youthful energy and delivers plenty of laughs between serious discussion topics.

If you haven't listened to the GET It podcast yet, then you're in for a treat! The show's three co hosts are some of the most impressive young community leaders in Texas who really loosen up their belts to chat informally with each other about what's in the news and on their minds. They invite us inside diverse communities to learn what's being discussed there and share engaging stories from their own personal and professional lives. You'll be privy to what some of the most influential young people in Texas think about topics that impact your life, as well as theirs.

But don't worry – there is no weird hidden agenda to this podcast. The podcasters don't always agree with each other and they don't expect that you will always agree either. The only goal of the podcast is to help you create your own, well-informed opinions about the world around you so that you'll want to GET informed, GET



engaged, and (if at all possible) GET out to vote.

This latest episode begins with the friendly reminder that Ryan made the long voyage down I10 from Austin to the podcast's recording studio here in San Antonio. Perhaps because the many perils of the road were so fresh on Ryan's mind, he wanted to chat about the one hundred and ten year sentence recently given to a Cuban truck driver who was involved in a fatal accident on a steep mountain road after his brakes failed. Was the sentence excessive? Was racism involved? "In that stressful situation", Ryan wonders, "how would you have reacted?"

Roy followed with a question that others have probably been wondering after several years of protests and intense discussions about systemic racism in America, "Do Black communities ralaround the fight for justice with greater solidarity than other communities?" ¿Que te parece? CPS Rate Hike

Next week, CPS Energy will ask the San Antonio City Council to approve a rate hike of 3.8%. While this is lower than the original estimated rate hike proposal of 8%, council still needs to pause and question CPS Energy's financial decision-making before approving any cost increase for customers.

After Winter Storm Uri, CPS Energy faced \$1 billion in fuel charges owed to various natural gas suppliers. Despite filing lawsuits against these natural gas companies for what they claim are unfair charges, CPS is still passing these costs on to ratepayers. The utility has paid \$413 million to natural gas sup-

pliers so far, and will add \$1.50 to customer bills for the next 25 years to pay for that. CPS Energy is still in a legal battle for the remaining \$587 million that natural gas companies contend that the utility owes. If CPS Energy ends up paying that, too, it will add even more to our bills in the future. City council needs to ensure that CPS Energy is prepared to keep customers safe and warm in the event of another extreme weather event, and to protect customers from getting slammed with another billion dollar bill.

City council also needs to ensure that CPS Energy reigns in reckless spending before they approve a rate hike. KSAT News recently reported that the former number two person at the utility, Fred Bonewell, had been using the company credit card to buy expensive steak dinners, chauffeured rides, daily lunches everyday and even expensive Beats headphones. Former President and CEO, Paula Gold-Williams also used limousine services and purchased flowers and gift baskets all at the expense of rate payers. These frivolous expenses were an egregious abuse of raterpayers' trust.

Not too long after the start of the pandemic, CPS Energy suspended power disconnections for nonpayment. In October they resumed the disconnections. Even before the pandemic some customers struggled to pay their utility bills.

When CPS Energy comes to council for a rate approval they need to ensure that low income customers are shielded from disconnections and rate hikes that will put even more financial strain on families that struggle to keep their lights on, stay warm during the winter and cool during the summer. Before any rate hike is imposed, CPS Energy should change the rate structure because the current structure doesn't encourage conservation and rewards heavier users with lower rates.

The utility isn't considering the costs it will incur to

transform our power supply even though the Spruce Coal Plant failed to provide power during Winter Storm Uri. the San Antonio City council should demand that CPS Energy address the climate crisis and explore renewable energy sources.

City council is the last line of defense for ratepayers. CPS Energy board of trustees are the utility's decision makers. They are expected to review CPS Energy's financials every month, yet they have failed to protect customers from outrageous spending by executives. City council needs to step up and ensure that CPS is being fiscally responsible before any rate hikes are approved.
