has been defined as "the use of oppressive strategies—including corporal punishment, shame, and fear-to manipulate children into behaving," which causes significant harm to a child's development. To agree would be to question our traditions. It would mean what we have always believed and practiced, and has always been accepted as normal, is not. Something that is part of our culture; part of who we are and how we got here is now considered not just wrong but harmful. Most of the people I know laugh about it. Is this wrong too? Do you agree that the chancla culture does more damage than good? Let's talk about it..

Leon Gaytan: "Parenting is hard but our little ones need us to do it with all the wisdom, love, gentleness and strength. We can't go wrong if we exercise a firm and consistent hand with a soft and loving heart."

Joshua Garien: "I've had Hispanic students in the past joke about la chancla, and I never really understood it until I saw comedy videos on it. They were some of my most well behaved students. Muchas gracias a todas las madres y abuelas."

Sara Arredondo: "Yes, been a victim of the chancla since about 4 lol! Don't forget the matamoscas."

Ester Foster: "Not a victim but a user of the chancla!"

Carolina Roberts: "Never had the chancla, but my Dad started time out back in the 80s. He didn't know but it wasn't really a punishment. Then he'd forget and I'd go off after a while."

Lydia Curran: "If the kid needs it, you know the old saying: spare the rod, spoil the child and some kids are just spoiled brats and don't know how to act unless you give them a spanking. If they need a spanking, I say give it to them. If they don't then don't. Don't be abusive, just use common sense. Different kids, different situations. That's what makes the world go round right."

Janie Saravia: "This is another example of how we over analyze everything. And at

times, call the good-bad and bad-good. Yes, that was not a good way to discipline but at least there was some. Psychological damage can come through words. And violence through games, which is prevalent today."

Cynthia Eugene Bustamante: "I agree it does psychological damage and also it is teaching violence. We all individually have different reactions to certain actions. I'm glad that it was a success in instances where you were spanked. I have seen children from both single and two parent households. Some used physical punishment and some didn't. Children from every scenario had both the well-behaved and the misbehaved. It's very hard to be biased."

Jose Carrasquillo El Padrino: "I don't know that there is anything wrong with me and our parents who used the chancla. My wife uses the chancla and the broom and all of our kids are respectful and good citizens. None ever was in jail or accused of stealing. So to me, I don't see anything wrong with it. Naturally, it also depends on how you use the chancla. I work at a school and I see a lot of disrespect in today's generation. I don't see anything wrong with me and I have never been in jail or accused of being violent. In fact, my family thinks I'm too soft at times."

Gregg Alvarez: "My abuelas was like a boomerang and would turn and hit you no matter how hard you tried to get away."

Manny Santana Montilla: "At this point, get over it. I was affected by it heavily, setting me back until I stopped the self pity and moved forward. I did everything I could to improve on my parents' approach but unfortunately sometimes you have to save them from themselves at any cost!!! So not perfect but better."

Mary Svetlik Watkins: "Several districts in Texas have gone back to paddling. Look at our new generation of kids growing up. They need discipline. We are seeing kids shooting up schools today. That didn't happen when we got spanked."

Bobby Triana Jr.: "Kids growing up need discipline. Without it, you're seeing the results of lack of respect for everyone, even their own parents. I am not saying to beat a kid but to discipline. I came from good and hard parents but I led my own way to self-destruction. Thank God I survived and changed through life's lessons, the hard ones. It starts at home. It is sad to say mothers are being both parents but they can still raise their children to respect and be good children."

Jasmine Howard: "Pobrecitos!! That thin chancla sounds like heaven compared to the beating you would get in a black household! Seriously!! Growing up, my brother and I would get beat with a thick leather belt if we ever did something wrong. My mom would tear up my butt so hard, but I was too stubborn to learn the easy way."

Victor Medina: "The chancla really worked on me. Believe me, all of my brothers and sisters were educated by la chancla, lol. Thanks to la chancla I am the person that I am now. I grew up very straight."

Alice Rivera: "Yo that's nothing! We Puerto Rican got the drama with the chancla and the correa! Yeah that's right, nothing more dramatic than the Correa."

Carrie Sullivan: "My mom Dawn Erler and grandma Linda Sullivan used to get me with Chancla on a stick when I was little."

David Beach: "If you are a victim of a chancla, you may be entitled to compensation."

Farrah Jacques: "My mami was so good with the cinto, she should have gotten a Vegas show!"

Helen Santillan: "I forgot about the Chancla. I can't stop laughing at the memories running out of the house. I survived and my kids survived. It is a Latina thing."

Jose Olmos: "The chancha, el cinturón, the wooden spoon. I've had them all."

Christina Cole: "Yessss, it wasn't called a chancla in our house but I was definitely a victim of it in my childhood!!"

Randy Martinez: "I'm more scared of la chancla than la llorona."



San Antonio's Westside Remembered in New Memoir

It isn't every day a son gets to write an article about their Mother, but here I am, doing exactly that. At the age of seventy-five, my mother, Teresa Villarreal Rodriguez, recently published a book titled, "Home, Where Memories Wait to be Remembered." The book is about everyday life in San Antonio's Westside during the 50's and 60's. My Jefita was raised in a patchwork-type family stitched together after her mother's died when she was 6 months old and her siblings were 10, 8, 4, and 2 years. They were raised by her father's mother; his sister and brother-in-law who had a five-year-old daughter.

When I asked my Mom why she wrote these stories, she replied, "In the beginning, I wrote because I wanted to leave my children, grandchildren and extended family a written history of our life. Specifically, who raised us and how we were raised. But as I kept writing, I realized there were other reasons for writing."


The book of short stories brings life to her grandmother's penchant for prayer to all her favorite santitos, yet even though she was a woman of faith, she was not afraid to use her gift as a curandera for the good of others. The stories describe growing up in a rich culture that includes rituals such as Cortando Las Nubes and Curando de Susto and traditions like Tamaladas, Bolo, and house limpias. Some stories are funny, others are tragic and sad, yet most show a strong community and the dignity of the people living on the Westside.

Writing about a different reality about the Westside was also one of her goals in publishing her book. She said, "There was so much more to the Westside than what the rest of the city saw on the news. I wanted my stories to capture the vibrant feeling of daily living that took place on our part of town; the color, noise and mouth-watering aromas drifting out of small cramped kitchens as dinners were prepared. And I wanted readers to get a sense of the strong, resilient and generous people in my neighborhood"

The memoir is published and available for sale by Conocimientos Press. It was during the pandemic that my mom shared a few stories with her Facebook family and caught the attention of publisher and UTSA professor emerita Josie Méndez-Negrete, and something to marvel. What is endearing about San Antonio's Westside will be remembered for generations to come.

My Madre spent the last 12 years of her work life teaching high school in SAISD and it's endearing how she speaks with such affection about her students. However, she says that the majority of her students were not aware of their amazingly beautiful culture. She believes that because of the troubling world we live in, our youth needs to know their roots in order to know who they are. By discovering they come from strong, resilient people they will be better able to weather the hard times they will encounter. At the end of our conversacion, she added "Hijo, if my stories connect people to their culture, I will finally understand this 30 plus year journey that I have traveled."



Flaco Jimenez: A South Texas Music Virtuoso

Flaco Jimenez's music journey has been as imposing as a Texas Tornado, as sizzling as a Super Seven Texas sun, and as dramatic as a rocking Rolling Stone. The magical reference in those names reveals different moments that brought Flaco Jimenez added music fame. With over 120 albums and an estimated 1500 singles, Flaco is a music studio's dream recording machine. His many recordings and performances have won him five Grammys and a Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award. Flaco's six decades of playing have enlivened the rich conjunto and Norteño Borderland sounds.

Flaco grew up in a talented musical family. His grandfather, Patricio Jimenez, a native of Eagle Pass, gave Flaco's dad, Don Santiago Jimenez, his first music lessons. Patricio Jimenez came to San Antonio as a young man and found work in the quarry adjacent to Brackenridge Park. The family lived in the "Mexican Village," a housing camp for laborers located next to the quarry.

The musicians of that era all had day jobs and played for tips in the evenings or weekends. Many of them found receptive audiences at the Plaza de Zacate, a city park across from Farmer's Produce Market, which is now Market Square. It was there that the famed singer, Lydia Mendoza, got her start.

Flaco loved to listen to his father play the accordion. As a preschool child, Flaco often sat in the living room in awe as his dad wrote songs and practiced new musical scores. By age six Flaco began to practice with his dad's accordion and bajo sexto while his father was away at work. His dad came home early one day and found Flaco playing. His dad's tears told Flaco that his dad not only approved but that he saw musical talent in his son.

Flaco has fond memories of the day his music career began in

1947 at age eight. Flaco had gone with his dad to watch him perform at "El Gaucho," a nightclub on El Paso Street on the Westside of San Antonio. Cruz Saenz, owner of the nightclub contracted Don Santiago in the mid-1940s, and the accordion maestro played there every weekend over the next ten years. [Full disclosures: Cruz Saenz was my uncle, the brother of my grandmother, Maria Saenz Romo, who also lived on El Paso Street]. I first went to the nightclub when I was 14, and I vividly recall the great conjunto music of Don Santiago Jimenez.

Don Santiago played a fourhour performance in the evenings from eight to midnight. One evening the bass player suggested to Don Santiago that his son could play a few songs during the break. At age eight, Flaco felt confident enough to step in that night when his father took a short break. Joined by the band, Flaco played some of his father's songs and received loud audience applause.

A member of the band passed a collection hat afterward and gave Flaco the coins that the pleased crowd contributed in appreciation. This night marked the first earnings of his career as a musician. It was enough to buy his sisters and brothers candy treats the following day. Soon after that event, Don Santiago gave his son his famous nickname–Flaco.

Flaco, who plays both the bajo sexto and accordion, formed his band at age 15, Los Caporales. By the 1960s he had become one of South Texas' most popular TexMex musicians. Flaco was famous in Texas, but little known nationally, and largely unknown internationally. Flaco's friend, Doug Sahm, founder of the Sir Douglas Quintet, invited Flaco in 1973 to record with him for Atlantic Records. Music critic James Head wrote that Doug Sahm released the album "Doug Sahm and Band" with help from his friends Flaco Jimenez, Bob Dylan, and Dr. John. The album includes the popular song "Is Anybody Going to San Antone?"

Doug Sahm's album helped Flaco gain national exposure, but Flaco's introduction to international audiences came with his association with the famed singer and master guitarist, Ry Cooder. In the mid-seventies, Cooder invited Flaco to join him on a European tour. Cooder loved Flaco's music and in 1976 included him in his album "Chicken Skin Music." Flaco, in his late forties by then, was becoming the most admired and most well-known representative of TexMex music.

Every decade has had its memorable moments for Flaco. One of his more important memories of the mid-1970s occurred when a documentary film crew from California came to South Texas to produce a movie about the region's important Norteño and

TexMex musicians. The movie, "Chulas Fronteras," brought Chris Strachwitz, founder of Arhoolie Records, and famed documentary film producer, Les Blank, to Texas. Bank filmed several TexMex and Norteño bands and singers. Among the stars of the movie were the Jimenez family- Don Santiago, his son Santiago, and Flaco. Also featured were Lydia Mendoza and the famed Norteño band, "Los Aleges de Teran."

Music historian David Witt commented that "Chulas Fronteras" included many of the songs

that are "standard tales of unrequited or dysfunctional love-Lydia Mendoza's rendition of "Mal Hombre" and "La Nueva Zenaida" by Flaco Jiménez." Flaco's introduction to Strachwitz and Arhoolie Records led to the release in 1978 of the album "Flaco Jimenez & His Conjunto" and to a famous Flaco recording of "Ay Te Dejo en San Antonio" which won Flaco his Grammy in 1986.

In 1989, Doug Sahm formed the Texas Tornados inviting Freddy Fender, Augie Meyers, and Flaco Jimenez to join him.

Soon after, they were signed by the prestigious recording studio Warner Brothers Reprise, and the group recorded its first album "Texas Tornados" in 1990. The popular album hit Number 5 on the country charts, and a song from that album, "Soy de San Luis," won the 1991 Grammy for Best Mexican American Performance.

Flaco was performing in San Francisco in 1994 when he received a call from Mick Jagger of the Rolling Stones. Would he fly to Los Angeles and add a song to their album? A quick

"yes" got him on a flight to the City of Angels where he recorded an accordion solo for the Stones' upcoming album "Voodoo Lounge." Soon after, Raul Malo of the Mavericks invited Flaco to join them in their album "Music for All Occasions." Flaco made a notable contribution to the Mavericks' popular rendition of "All You Ever Do Is Bring Me Down."

Flaco joined with some of the great Latino music talents in the late 1990s when they formed Los Super Seven. The band performed to full houses with Cesar Rosas and David Hidalgo of Los Lobos and famed musicians Freddy Fender, Rick Trevino, Ruben Ramos, Doug Sahn, Max Baca, Raul Malo, and Joe Ely. Twenty years later, Flaco still performs with some of his Super Seven friends. When Flaco and I met in late August, he was preparing for an upcoming recording session.

As I listened to Flaco talk about his truly memorable music career, I realized again that I was in the presence of an amazing musical genius who has made Latinos all over the world proud of this South Texas heritage.

OFFICE OF THE COUNTY MANAGER



On July 12, 2011, Bexar County Commissioners Court established the Office of the County Manager in an effort to develop a more effective and cost-efficient reorganization of the functions, offices and departments that report to Commissioners Court. I am honored to serve the Bexar County community in the role as County Manager.

I am mindful of the need to address demands for new and better services for our growing population. With the support of Commissioners Court, I would like to share a number of important priorities and some of the steps I am taking and expect to take to move these initiatives forward:

SERVICES TO THE UNINCORPORATED AREA

In spite of limited revenue growth, the population of the County is projected to continue to grow. Working with County offices and departments, I already have staff identifying the demand for new services that this population growth will create. Over the next years, we will identify all legal tools and practical options available to provide more "citylike" services to these areas.

CULTURAL AND HISTORIC COUNTY ASSETS PROGRAM

Bexar County is blessed to have a number of County-

owned historic and cultural assets. One of the most obvious of these assets is our historic Courthouse. In order to ensure that we identify, preserve, highlight, and, where appropriate, augment these treasures, we have established a Cultural and Historic County Asset program. This program is charged with bringing greater public awareness to these County assets.

BEXAR COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH CONSORTIUM

In 2008, Commissioners Court took the extraordinary action of allocating general fund money for the institution of a Mental Health Court (MHC) and for the enhanced provision of services by the Center for Health Care Services. This effort will remain a high priority of the County Manager's office and we will provide assistance and support to the MHC.

COORDINATION OF ALTERNATIVES TO INCARCERATION

Bexar County has made great strides over the past few years in initiating programs to reduce the number of individuals incarcerated in our Adult Detention Center, as well as identifying ways to reduce their length of stay, all while preserving public safety.

TRANSPORTATION

Bexar County Commissioners Court has historically taken a leadership role in identifying and solving important transportation issues in the County. The Alamo Regional Mobility, the Texas Department of Transportation, and Bexar County have worked together to develop the "825 Plan", a comprehensive funding approach for the development of several transportation projects in the region, including the 281 Project, IH-10 Project, and Loop 1604 Project. The goal of the partnership is to address much needed congestion relief in several highly traveled corridors including IH-10, Loop 1604, and US 281.

SAN PEDRO CREEK FEASIBILITY STUDY

Commissioners Court and the County Manager initiated a feasibility study of redevelopment of the downtown segment of San Pedro Creek. This is one of the Westside Creeks Initiative that grew from successes experienced with the ecosystem restoration of the San Antonio River. San Antonio River Authority was engaged to study San Pedro Creek, selected as the first among the Westside Creeks to be considered for redevelopment.

My office will continue our diligent, proactive efforts to ensure the Bexar County community remains an exceptional place to live and a desired place to visit.

David L. Smith, County Manager, graduated from the University of Texas in San Antonio in 1991 with a BBA in Marketing. In 1993, he received an MS in Finance from Louisiana State University. In 1998, he was awarded his second graduate degree, an MS in Urban Administration, from Trinity University.

Prior to joining Bexar County, Mr. Smith's employment includes several years of retail management and serving as a Research Assistant at Louisiana Real Estate Research Institute. He began his employment with Bexar County in January of 1997 as a Budget Intern in the Planning and Resource Management Department. He has since held every position in the Budget Division. Additional areas of responsibility have included managing the County Economic Development functions and serving as the Community Arena Project Fiscal Officer. In 2004, he became the Executive Director for the Planning and Resource Management Department, and the County's Budget Officer. In that capacity, he was responsible for administering the activities of three major divisions -- Budget, Management & Financial Services, and Human Resources.

In July of 2011, Mr. Smith was appointed the first ever County Manager, by a unanimous vote of Commissioners Court.

Leonardo "Flaco" Jiménez Recieves Hildago Lifetime Achievement Award from Bexar County

A native son of the Westside of San Antonio, Leonardo "Flaco" Jiménez learned to play and write songs from his father Santiago Jiménez, who learned from his father, Patricio Jiménez. The family, all proud Texans, were once residents of the "Mexican Village" of Brackenridge Park early in the last century.

Jiménez is a music industry legend who has won six Grammy Awards and a Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award. Other awards include the Billboard Latin Music Lifetime Achievement Award, the Tejano Music Award, the Texas Medal of Arts with his brother Santiago, a National Heritage Fellowship from the National Endowment of the Arts, a Lifetime Achievement Award for Instrumentalists from the Americana Music Association, the Top of Texas Award from the Country Music Association of Texas, and

the History-Making Texas Award from the Texas State History Museum Foundation. All Texans can be proud of "Flaco" for his contributions to song and music over the past six decades.

Jiménez contributed to popularizing conjunto and accordion music with his performances with Willie Nelson, Buck Owens, the Rolling Stones, Bob Dlyan, the Texas Tornados, Flaco and Max; Max Baca and Los Texmaniacs, and with the Mavericks. In addition, he has performed in movies with Woody Allen.

A photograph of Flaco Jiménez by San Antonio photographer Al Rendon was recently acquired by the National Portrait Gallery of the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C.

Jiménez is a musical genius whose music has entertained generations of music lovers from across the world. The National Recording Registry selected one of

his albums recently calling Jiménez "a champion of traditional conjunto music and Tex-Mex culture who also is known for innovation and collaboration with a variety of artists."

***Flaco Jiménez merits the Hidalgo Award* or Lifetime Achievement Award* from the Bexar County Court for

enriching and promoting Tejano, Mexican, and conjunto music. Flaco is among the few Texas artists whose music has reached fans worldwide.





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
